# **Three Home Upgrades Worth Your Money**

If you don't care about blowing tens of thousands of dollars on upgrades that add little to nothing to your home's value, you might as well stop reading and Google what's currently going on with Kim Kardashian and clan. But if you do care—and you should if you ever plan to sell—then Remodeling Magazine's annual Cost vs Value Report for 2016 is a must-read.

Still interested? Of course your are.

Let's begin by acknowledging the report's biggest takeaway: All the academics and

real estate pros are right to "tout the value of projects that promote curb appeal." Read on to see why, and where else you money is or isn't well spent.

Worth it. A new front door.

You're looking at ROIs (return on investments) of 91.1 percent for a steel one, and 82.3 percent for a more upscale (and expensive) fiberglass one. Of course, a fresh coat of paint on your existing door can help spiff things up too.

• Not worth it: upscale bathroom remodeling.

You may think everyone shares your vision of a huge bathroom with a whirlpool tub, heated towel bars, and stone countertops. Not so, warns Patsy O'Neill, a sales associate with Sotheby's in Montclair,



New Jersey: "You could spend \$60,000 or so on it, and it still might not suit a buyer's taste." Which helps explain why it had one of the worst ROIs.

•Worth it: fiberglass attic insulation.

A huge win for green enthusiasts. The magazine finally agreed to add an energy-efficiency project, and it topped the list by recouping 116.9 percent of its cost.

• Not worth it: composite deck addition.

Sadly, this is another also-ran, and not worth

the money. But be aware that sometimes even the seemingly coolest upgrades may simply be out of whack for a particular neighborhood. "You can turn your house into a palace, but the payoff will be small if it's the only mansion on the block," Craig Webb, Remodeling's editor-in-chief, tells Time.com.

• Worth it: a new roof.

"Buyers pay a premium for one already in place," according to credit. com. A perennial Remodeling Magazine A-lister, it's the ultimate curb appeal enhancer when you consider that your roof is the first thing potential buyers notice even before getting out of their cars.

• Not worth it: an upscale master suite.

Those same "taste" issues aside, returns of only about half your investment make this yet another expensive swing-and-a-miss.

# How To Cool Down Summer A/C Bills

As we all know, hot weather is already just around the corner here in our area. Plus, you have probably also notices the rate hikes from the power companty since last year.

Here are some options for homeowners to lower energy use:

• Make your yard work for you. It's a well-known fact that strategically placed greenery can add to a house's all-important "curb appeal." Adding trees, shrubs, and spiffy, vine-covered trellises also happens to work wonders against the sizzling sun.

"Trees reduce bills, not just by shading your house, but by cooling the air by releasing moisture," Asa Foss of the U.S. Green Building Council tells AARP.

- Know that ceiling fans can be your best friend. Decrease the use of electricity-gobbling air-conditioners with this simple little trick: "[Running fans] counter-clockwise will push hot air up in the summer"—your goal —"and clockwise will trap heat inside to keep your rooms warmer during cooler months," advises U.S. News & World Report.
- Make sure your attic is properly ventilated. You might as well just send your utility company a blank check if you lack what Jason Joplin, program manger of the Center for the Advancement of Roofing Excellence, calls "a continual flow of air to help protect the efficiency of your attic's insulation." The offender working against achieving that? Excess moisture build-up that clings to your roof's underside in winter from seemingly benign sources i.e., appliances, showers, and cooking vapors before ultimately soaking the insulation when the condensed moisture falls.



Joplin's suggestion to help ward off the problem? A properly balanced ventilation system consisting of Cobra Ridge Vent (installed at the ridge) and Cobra IntakePro (installed at the eave) by GAF (gaf.com), North America's leading roofing manufacturer. "Both work in tandem to allow cool, fresh air to enter at the eave edge while forcing moist, super-heated air out of the ridge vent," he explains.

• Beware of sneaky thermostats. Your big-screen TVs all over the house are almost certainly the envy of the neighborhood, but you're making an expensive mistake if they — or even lamps — are positioned near air conditioning thermostats. "The thermostat senses heat from these appliances, which can cause the air conditioner to run longer than necessary," advises the website HomeEnergySaver.
