Brooker Creek Preserve - "Our Wildest Place"

At approximately 8700 acres, Brooker Creek Preserve is the largest natural area in Pinellas County. It consists primarily of forested wetlands and pine flatwoods. Bordered by dense urban development, the Preserve provides both a unique refuge for native flora and fauna as well as an opportunity for citizens to explore the natural beauty of wild Florida.

The Preserve also serves to protect a significant portion of the Brooker Creek Watershed. A complex of hiking and equestrian trails provide visitors an opportunity to explore the Preserve's many ecosystems.

The award-winning Brooker Creek Preserve Environmental Education Center supports the applied management and ecological monitoring objectives of the division through educational programming and volunteerism.

The Center provides a window into natural Florida through interpretive programs and guided nature tours with educational instruction, exhibits and public outreach activities, presentations and workshops, and other events. Residents and visitors alike who are curious to learn more about the Preserve and its history can experience, discover and better understand the connections between people and the land through Center offerings.

Nestled amid a wetland forest alongside Brooker Creek, the Center is a beautiful, 25,000-square-foot, threebuilding complex designed in old Florida Pioneer-style architecture. It includes a 6,000-square-foot exhibit area, indoor and out-of-doors classrooms, and an auditorium capable of seating over 200 people.

A Resource Center is available for citizens seeking help with projects such as landscaping with native plants, retention pond reclamation, or identification of flora and



OAKLEAF VILLAGE TRIVIA

Did you know?

- Oakleaf Village was established by Criterion Corporation in February 1976
- The four original builders constructed model homes on Red Oak.
 White Oak and Bamboo
- Walter Crowley and Bob Roberts were two of the founders of the Oakleaf Village Homeowners' Association (OVHA)
- The bylaws for OVHA were codified in 1978
- The first OVHA president was Nancy Branch
- Walter Crowley was the first newsletter editor
- OVHA presented the first Academic Achievement Award in 1987 to Kim Kass
- The first OVHA Spring Fling was in 2002
- As the result of a contest, the OVHA newsletter was renamed Village View in 2003
- OVHA continues to provide a security patrol, maintenance of the entrances, social activities, the newsletter and website, awards, government representation and more

OAKLEAF VILLAGE IS A DEED RESTRICTED COMMUNITY. WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

Oakleaf Village is a deed-restricted community of 478 homes, divided into nine units each with a separate and slightly different set of deed restrictions. The deed restrictions are a legal and binding attachment to each and every purchase or occupancy in Oakleaf Village. The purpose of deed restrictions is to maintain the quality and consistency, as well as the aesthetic and financial value of the entire development.

The Officers and Board Of Directors of the Oakleaf Village Homeowners' Association, Inc. are elected annually and are governed by a set of BYLAWS that charge them with the authority to protect and enhance the value of the Village by maintaining compliance with the Deed Restrictions.

When OVHA is informed of a deed restriction violation, we notify the homeowner and request that they fix the violation. If it is a city code violation, the city of Tarpon Springs is notified and OVHA monitors the situation and the city's actions. We always look for amicable solutions. We want Oakleaf to remain a pleasant and livable community for all residents.
