
Gasparilla Pirate Invasion and Parade- Tampa

When: January 22nd @, 11:30am – 6:00 pm


Where: Bayshore Blvd


President and treasurer to retire at end of 2023!

DARK NIGHTS

We are going into the dark time of the year. Working folks who exercise before work will be doing it in the dark. People who like an early start on the day will also be out. Daylight savings time ended November 6, which made daylight an hour earlier.

Last year I nearly ran someone down. He was walking down the street in my lane dressed in long sleeve black hoodie and black trousers. Trees blocked the street light from lighting him, and blocked the moonlight from lighting him. The headlight on my bike did find him, but I was uncomfortably close when it did.

The sidewalks are frequently blocked by parked cars (over 75 cars blocking sidewalks) Most sidewalks go around the corner instead of reaching the street, forcing you to go across grass, and sprinklers sprinkle the sidewalk. People who want unobstructed walking like the street. Walk near the curb facing traffic—if a car is coming at you, you want to see it and get out of the way.

Cars use headlights. Pedestrians and bicycles have no such requirement—but common sense dictates that they should. You put your life at risk if you are in the street and cars can't see you. Or on the Pinellas trail and a bike is approaching.

Bicycle headlights are inexpensive and easy to find all bicycle shops, Ace hardware, Walmart, Amazon, etc. Have some fun with it and buy lights for your wheels—I have had many complements on my wheel lights.

Human lights vary from inexpensive clip-ons to headlamps to body lights changing to rainbow colors in LED tubes, with a flashlight in front. Available in Ace hardware, Walmart, Amazon, any camping supply, etc.

Safety Vests are widely available and cost as little as \$5. They are light colored to be easily seen, and have reflective strips that will blaze back when caught in headlight or flashlight. For fancier gear, illumiNITE on the web sells classy reflective jackets, shirts, etc.

The life you save could be your own.
